The Changing Seasons: Advent And Christmas

In most sections of the country, there are distinct changes in the seasons of the year. For example, the barren branches and slippery snow of winter eventually give way to the budding leaves and bright flowers of spring. While it's not uncommon to hear complaints in January about the bitter cold and similar protests in July about the unbearable heat, many people say that they'd have it no other way - they like the seasonal changes.

Over the centuries, the Christian Church has recognized its own changing seasons - the "church year" or "liturgical calendar." Most people could name a few of these seasons, such as Christmas, Lent, and Easter. But what is the purpose of observing these different seasons? And what is the benefit of maintaining the distinctiveness of the seasons even as fewer and fewer people are aware of them?

To answer these questions, we'll consider two seasons that will soon be upon us: Advent and Christmas. Advent comprises the three to four weeks that precede Christmas Day. Its purpose is not to celebrate the birth of Jesus - that will come at Christmas - but to humble ourselves before the coming King.

- It's during Advent that we're reminded how ancient Israel waited for the promised Saviour.
- This is the season in which we hear the preaching of John the Baptist who points us to Jesus.
- Advent is a time of patient waiting as we pause to ponder the great gift whose birth we will celebrate on Christmas.

The world, of course, has no idea as to what the season of Advent is even about. Long before December rolls around, the trappings of Christmas can be found everywhere. The reasoning is quite simple: if lights and tinsel and seasonal signs can get you into the Christmas spirit, you'll be more generous with your purchases. But once December 25 passes, don't expect to find many reminders of Christmas.

How different it is in the Church. By keeping Advent as a distinct season, we give ourselves the opportunity to savour the beauty of God's plan of salvation. Then, when Christmas finally arrives, our celebration knows the joy of the shepherds as we join in the song of the angels.

Our observance of Advent might be compared to children who wait for weeks to open the presents that temptingly rest under the Christmas tree. The excitement builds and builds until finally the day arrives and the gifts are opened. By sharing in the anticipation of Advent, we arrive at Christmas -- including the 12 days after it which lead up to Epiphany on January 6 - with a deeper understanding and appreciation of the great gift that God has given by sending His Son in the flesh to save this world from sin and death.

Dear Friends in Christ, our King, born to save us

I think that most people are familiar with the story behind the beloved Christmas hymn, "Silent Night". Briefly, Joseph Mohr, assistant priest in the Church of St. Nicholas in the region of Tyrol, received word that the church organ would not

function. He decided that he must write his own Christmas hymn immediately in order to have music for the special Christmas Eve mass. He did not want to disappoint his faithful flock. Upon completing the text, he took his words to Franz Gruber, who exclaimed when he saw them, "Friend Mohr, you have found it—the right song—God be praised!" Gruber soon completed a tune for the text. His simple but beautiful music blended perfectly with the spirit of Father Mohr's words. The carol was completed in time for the Christmas Eve mass, and Father Mohr and Franz Gruber sang their new hymn to the accompaniment of Gruber's guitar. The hymn made a deep impact upon the parishioners even as it has on succeeding generations.

Just as the Grinch couldn't keep Christmas from coming, neither can a simple malfunction of the organ. God's people will always find ways of celebrating the glorious news that God became man to live the life we never could live, and then give His life as a ransom for the sins of the whole world. How blessed we are to know the truth of God's Word, which He inspired St. Paul to write: "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons." (Galatians 4:4–5, ESV)

There may be all sorts of things that seem unsettling this Christmas. It could be a trip that is cancelled, or a family member who has to work while everyone else is enjoying Christmas vacation. Sadly, the Christmas tree falls over on Christmas Eve, or a vandal steals part of your outdoor display. The dishwasher goes kaput just as we are preparing for the Christmas feast, or a trip to the hospital brings sad news. For some, it is the memory of the loss of a loved one or some other pain that is manifested at Christmas.

In a little church in the Alps, a less than perfect night brought one of the greatest songs of Christmas. On a less than ideal night in Bethlehem, the miracle of salvation is revealed to the world. Even in our struggles, the Christ of Christmas is still at work for us and for our salvation. That is the only thing that really matters—Christ, our Saviour is born. That is our hope. That is our confidence. This good news brings us peace and joy, even when that peace and joy seems to elude us. Yes, out of even the worst of circumstances, God can bring good. He does bring blessing. He does lift us up in His loving arms.

In that confidence and hope, rejoice in your Saviour this Christmas. Better yet, let that Christ go with you into each day of the new year! Cling to Him in faith. Come and hear His Words of forgiveness and life, and let them be your joy always!
