"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." (Colossians 3:12–13, ESV)

Dear Friends in Christ Jesus, our Lord

In the Lord's Prayer, Jesus teaches us to pray: *"Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us"*. Over the years, I have heard more than a few people express the thought, "what would it mean if God did forgive us only as we forgive others?

Yet how blessed a thing God's forgiveness is! St. John assures us: "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:8–9, ESV) It is the power of God's forgiveness for us that enables us to be forgiving to others. He teaches us what it really means to forgive.

There was a wonderful illustration of this recently in Dallas, Texas. An off -duty police officer, Amber Guyger, came in to her apartment one night and saw a black man standing there. So she shot and killed him. But she had gone into the wrong apartment! She was the intruder, and she killed a man in his own home. At her trial in Dallas, she was sentenced to 10 years in prison. Afterwards, the victims' family gets to have a say. The slain man's brother, 18-year-old Brandt Jean, told Guyger that he forgave her and hugged the woman who killed his brother. But there is more to the story than that.

Cut out of many news reports is what the young man said to her. He was not just extending his personal forgiveness. He was reaching out to her with Jesus. Here is what he said, somewhat edited. From C. C. Pecknold, The Day the World Saw God in a Dallas Courtroom:

> "I don't want to say twice or for the hundredth time how much you've taken from us. I think you know that."

> "I hope you go to God with all that guilt. If you truly are sorry...I forgive you. I know if you go to God and ask Him, He will forgive you."

"I love you just like anyone else...I personally want the best for you... I don't even want you to go to jail. I want the best for you, because I

know that's exactly what Botham would want...And the best would be to give your life to Christ. Giving your life to Christ is the best thing Botham would want you to do. Again, I love you as a person, and I don't wish anything bad on you."

Turning to the Judge, Brandt almost begged, "I don't know if this is possible, but can I give her a hug please? Please?" The Judge conceded to the request, and Amber wept in Brandt's arms. Brandt was sharing Christ's hard-won forgiveness, which poured over into his own ability to forgive.

Of course the killer wept. The guard wept. The aggrieved family wept. The judge wept and was moved to then give her Bible to the prisoner. Everybody in the courtroom, I dare say, wept. Brandt was under no obligation to forgive her. The killer was not let off. She still has to go to prison for 10 years. But Brandt was extending to her a tangible picture of God's grace, His unmerited favour, which is all the hope any of us have and which can lead us to treat others with grace as well.

Grace is indeed hard to understand. It isn't fair. But it doesn't let anyone off the hook. It is transformative.

I also know of a family who showed that same power of forgiveness. They had very little, and lived hand to mouth. One December, they were the victims of a break-in; something they really couldn't afford. Yet the next day, they wrote a letter to the local paper, addressing the burglar. They shared their heartache, but they also spoke those words of forgiveness, and shared how Jesus suffered and died to take away all sins from all people. They wanted the burglar to know that they could also trust Jesus to forgive them.

When the four Mounties were murdered in Mayerthorpe, Pastor Schiemann spoke of forgiveness for the man who murdered his son. God's forgiveness of our sins enables us to be forgiving towards others, who have sinned against us.

Paul calls us to be Christ-like, especially in being able to forgive. *as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must* 

*forgive.* This isn't always easy, but with the grace and help of God we can do it!

I appreciate the story of that young man in the Dallas courtroom. It speaks so well of what God's love for us in Christ truly does in our lives. I pray that we may see this same power of forgiveness at work in our lives, too!

# **Family Time in Christ**

In November we celebrate All Saints' Day. It often gets lost after the excitement of the costumes and candy of Halloween, but it is a celebration in the Church Year worth spending some time on as a family.

First, who are the saints? The saints are all those who have been made holy through faith in Jesus Christ. Scripture says that when we are baptized into Christ, we put Him on (Galatians 3:27). He becomes our clothing, and in Him we are saints.

Help your children understand that when they were baptized, they were covered over with Christ's righteousness. On November 1<sup>st</sup>, remind them of their baptism. Light their baptismal candle and explain that because they are a child of God they can be called "Saint (name)". If you have his or her white baptismal clothes, show them, or show them pictures. Maybe put white shirts on as you remember your baptisms. Remind your children that the white tells them that they are covered with Christ's righteousness.

On this day we remember the saints that have passed away. Help your child to remember any people in his or her life that have died believing in Jesus Christ. Read Revelation 7:9-17, which tells us about the multitude of saints that are in heaven. Pray, giving thanks for the faith of these saints that have gone before us, and asking God to keep your family members strong in their faith. A blessed All Saints' Day!

## **Renovate For Jaydon**



It's hard to believe that it has been 5 years today as I write this that we brought Jaydon home on October 20, 2014 after he had spent 157 days in the NICU – nothing short of a miracle!! Since the moment

he and his twin brother were born, everyone here in our church family at Foothills has surrounded us with their love, support and endless prayers. We firmly believe that if it wasn't for all those prayers made in earnest to our loving Father above, the boys may not be here with us today...

From the beginning, Jaydon has not had an easy life. The effects of being so premature and tiny were quickly recognized by us in the early days of him coming home, and it became quite evident that he would not reach the developmental milestones at the rate or age range that most children do who are born full term. Within his first year of life, Jaydon was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy which was caused by the trauma his brain suffered at birth, and dealt with many other issues associated with his prematurity. This included painful kidney stones which he has undergone multiple surgeries to remove, in addition to his epilepsy, which unfortunately is not currently managed under his current medications, and the doctors are still looking to find that right mix, and because most of his seizure activity goes on in his brain unnoticed to us, his cognitive and physical development continues to be affected by this.

Despite all of this, as hard as it is to process as a parent, we never feel alone for we are surrounded by such a loving community here at Foothills. We are still constantly amazed by the show of support and prayers, or just a kind word of encouragement that's much needed on those especially tough days. It is so wonderful to share those little triumphant moments with all of you, such as watching Jaydon after the children's message as he walks up the aisle to our pew in the back, with such determination and strength as he grips our hands tightly for support.

As we look back over these years, we are overwhelmed

and taken aback with how abundantly God has blessed us and Jaydon through this ordeal. But the biggest blessing yet, was in the summer when we had just moved in to our new house and it was announced that Jaydon would be the next recipient of a life-changing home renovation!! So for the next few months to come, the people from ARK will be building Jaydon a ramp from our house to the street and a completely accessible bathroom in our basement. Also on the wish list is a stair lift for both the upstairs and downstairs of our two-storey house which comes at a pretty high cost, so that will only be fulfilled if the project manages to raise enough money.

I'm sure we would both say that the most amazing part of this whole process, the one that keeps us asking *"should we pinch ourselves? Is this a dream,* is that this incredible renovation will not come at any cost to us. It is completely funded by donations from generous people who want to help make a difference in Jaydon's life. Each of the projects can only begin once we raise enough funds and materials to support the project. Another exciting part is that every dollar donated is being matched by the Calgary Children's Foundation up to \$15,000.

I am writing this just before the Thanksgiving long weekend, so thankfulness is on my mind. Being thankful for God's blessings has been a theme this past week in our preschool classroom. One of the books we read together was about a child who thought his friend was lucky having many toys, a maid to clean up his messes, and even a swimming pool in his back yard. The boy was feeling a little jealous. He was hesitant to reciprocate by inviting his friend over to play since he had fewer toys and was expected to help with chores around the house. However, when his friend did come, he had so much fun even though the dog chewed his shoe, the baby sister was pestering to be included, and they were expected to help by setting the table for supper. Surprisingly, his friend thoroughly enjoyed himself. The child with fewer toys had a pet, a sibling, more time with his parents and even grandparents who lived near by. He realized that he was blessed too, even if his blessings were different.

Some of our preschool parents are graduate students so they live on a modest income. They also pay increased university tuition as internationals so their children may not have as many toys and the family may not own a car. They may be far from grandparents and cousins. However, no matter whether we are blessed by having material possessions, loving family and friends, good health, enough food to eat, 5 senses, musical ability, athletic ability, or a keen mind that learns and retains concepts easily, Thanksgiving is a time to remember that all these gifts come from our loving heavenly Father. He loves us and blesses us every day.

The children made and illustrated a placemat that we laminated for them so they could use it for Thanksgiving dinner. It includes a traditional Thanksgiving prayer that families may wish to say before meals:

> "Thank you for the world so sweet. Thank you for the food we eat. Thank you for the birds that sing. Thank you, God, for everything."

### Thank you for your mite donations!

Jesus saw a poor widow put two very small mites (coins) into the temple treasury. "I tell you the truth," he said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out



of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on." (Luke 21: 2-4)

<u>Mites go toward mission grants at home and abroad</u>. Mission grant proposals are submitted and chosen by vote at national conventions every three years. Grants are paid to the recipients as required for them to carry out their mission work.

Example: 5,000 grant toward the National Youth Gathering in Langley, B.C. July 5 – 9, 2019. This mission grant is complete.

To learn more about LWML-C mission projects for 2018 - 2021, view the poster on the LWML-C bulletin board by the kitchen entrance.

The same process is followed when choosing mission grants at the district level.

Example: In 2015, Pastor Eric Moffett was awarded a \$10,000 ABC District mission grant for Bibles and study materials for his students at the University of Calgary. He continues to draw on this support.

<u>Foothills LWML-C Society Donations</u>. Our society also donates to other organizations. Some of our favourites are LAMP, LBT and Malabar Mission Society.

<u>Christmas Stocking Donation</u> Throughout the year, we put money in our Christmas stocking at our monthly meetings. We will soon decide who will receive this year's Christmas gift.

<u>Ongoing Donations</u> Used eyeglasses are sent around the world to help people with vision problems. Used postage stamps are sent to the Canadian Bible Society and sold to stamp collectors. Proceeds are used to buy Bibles for inmates in Canadian prisons. (Please leave <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> " border around the stamps.) Food Bank Items are sometimes given to hungry drop-ins who visit Foothills; surplus items are given to The Calgary Food Bank. <u>Please place your donations in the designated bins in the church foyer</u>. ## **Board of Stewardship**

#### November is Stewardship Month!

In the month of November we are going to reflect on our role as stewards of God's gifts to us. Stewardship is the giving of our time, talents and treasures out of thankfulness for all that God has done for us. We can give our time in a number of ways. We can volunteer at our Church, in our community, in one-on-one situations by helping others, by witnessing to others as opportunities arise or by simply taking time to worship, pray and spend time in the Word. Giving of our time basically means taking some time out of our busy lives to give some of this time back to God.

Giving of our talents means using the gifts God has given us to further his ministry on earth. Each of us has been given unique talents by our Lord. In Romans 12:6-8 the Bible says, "We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith, if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach, it if is to encourage, then give encouragement, if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently, if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully." Everyone of us has been given talents and we must be good stewards of those talents and ensure we use them in service to our Lord. Our Lord told us to use our talents and not hide them. **ONLINE** – The Board of Directors of Lutheran Church–Canada (LCC) has released a bulletin insert for congregations providing Synod's up-to-date financial information. LCC will is-

sue updates on Synod's financial information on a quarterly basis.

The insert highlights the variety of work Synod does on behalf of congregations in such areas as national and international missions, church worker education, leadership and member care, and community building. "To accomplish this work together," the insert notes, "generous offerings of faithful members throughout the country are needed. A portion of gifts laid upon the altar at local congregations is remitted to LC. In total, these gifts make up 68 percent of LCC's overall revenue and are critical for funding the vital work we do together."

The insert goes on to note, however, that LCC is currently facing a deficit "due to overall congregational remittances being less than expected." To that end, the BOD encourages congregations to "bring this matter to the Lord in prayer, trusting God to provide the resources needed to carry out His great commission."

## **Board of Elders**

At the September 15, 2019 Voters meeting, I shared that the Board was initiating a review of its duties under the parish's Constitutional By-Laws. Our first undertaking has been to discuss and align on what these By-Laws mean insofar as the Board of Elders' "primary responsibility" ... "the spiritual health of the whole congregation". As your Director, I sought the Board's understanding of how they interpreted the intent of this responsibility... What do we mean by "spiritual health"? How is this assessed? What do we mean when we refer to the "whole congregation"? i.e., what is the scope of 'whole congregation? This is what the Elders had to say:

- Positive "*spiritual health*" is evident when members are regularly attending worship services, partaking of Holy Communion, participating in Bible studies, and volunteering for service opportunities within the parish.
- The "*whole congregation*" means the current total of 657 Communicant Members, which includes all active members (+/-200) and inactive members (+/-450).
- Spiritual health is assessed through feedback from Elder-Member visitations.

I was very pleased with the aforementioned response by your Board members and see evidence of their commitment to member visitations.

I have a couple sobering concerns... (i) the apparent slow decline in attendance to regular Sunday worship services; and (ii) whether our parish will be able to sustain its *Statement of Direction*.

- <u>Slow Decline in Attendance of Regular Sunday Worship Services</u> Last year, our year to date (YTD) average attendance (as of September 2018) was 218 per Sunday worship service. Our 2019 YTD average attendance, from January 1, 2019 to and including this past September, was 194. For the month of September 2019, specifically, 176. I believe the Board of Elders will need to make a concerted effort to try to determine *why* this is happening.
- <u>Sustainability of our Statement of Direction</u> As you're aware, our parish's *Statement of Direction* has three key focus areas:

- *Christian growth of the family of God in Christ* connecting and building relationships with new and prospective members, offering regular alternative worship styles, initiatives to engage and support seniors, young and young adults.
- Pre-school Ministry development of Christian faith among preschool children and their families, teaching the basics of God's Word and Christian values and actions, building connections for students and their families with our church community.
- Campus Ministry development of Christian faith among university students, friends and family, forming relationships with students through meals, activities and other events (e.g., weekly on-campus Bible studies).
- A whole lot of 'real good stuff' is going on here! Exemplary leadership by our Pastors/Deaconess/ Preschool Principal in offering high quality, doctrinally sound worship services, Christian education programs and evangelical mission into the community... the University of Calgary, in particular. Today, our financial 'picture' is not good. As of the end of September, we are over \$100,000 below budget on 'receipts'... largely due to 'below budget' offerings (\$73,000). While expenses are down by roughly \$41,000, that still leaves a concerning deficit. It is not my intention to overstep into the duties of the Board of Stewardship... but I encourage all of you to ask yourself whether you see, as I do, the wonderful, Godpleasing scope of our mission activity at Foothills Lutheran Church. If you do and, like me, value it, the next question to each of us - me included - is what must each of us do to ensure that sustainably prevails?

The Lord's blessing upon each and every one of you, my dear brothers and sisters in Christ.
