# The Changing Seasons: Advent And Christmas

In most sections of the country, there are distinct changes in the seasons of the year. For example, the barren branches and slippery snow of winter eventually give way to the budding leaves and bright flowers of spring. While it's not uncommon to hear complaints in January about the bitter cold and similar protests in July about the unbearable heat, many people say that they'd have it no other way - they like the seasonal changes.

Over the centuries, the Christian Church has recognized its own changing seasons - the "church year" or "liturgical calendar." Most people could name a few of these seasons, such as Christmas, Lent, and Easter. But what is the purpose of observing these different seasons? And what is the benefit of maintaining the distinctiveness of the seasons even as fewer and fewer people are aware of them?

To answer these questions, we'll consider two seasons that will soon be upon us: Advent and Christmas. Advent comprises the three to four weeks that precede Christmas Day. Its purpose is not to celebrate the birth of Jesus - that will come at Christmas - but to humble ourselves before the coming King.

- It's during Advent that we're reminded how ancient Israel waited for the promised Saviour.
- This is the season in which we hear the preaching of John the Baptist who points us to Jesus.
- Advent is a time of patient waiting as we pause to ponder the great gift whose birth we will celebrate on Christmas.

The world, of course, has no idea as to what the season of Advent is even about. Long before December rolls around, the trappings of Christmas can be found everywhere. The reasoning is quite simple: if lights and tinsel and seasonal signs can get you into the Christmas spirit, you'll be more generous with your purchases. But once December 25 passes, don't expect to find many reminders of Christmas.

How different it is in the Church. By keeping Advent as a distinct season, we give ourselves the opportunity to savour the beauty of God's plan of salvation. Then, when Christmas finally arrives, our celebration knows the joy of the shepherds as we join in the song of the angels.

Our observance of Advent might be compared to children who wait for weeks to open the presents that temptingly rest under the Christmas tree. The excitement builds and builds until finally the day arrives and the gifts are opened. By sharing in the anticipation of Advent, we arrive at Christmas -- including the 12 days after it which lead up to Epiphany on January 6 - with a deeper understanding and appreciation of the great gift that God has given by sending His Son in the flesh to save this world from sin and death.



Dear friends in Christ,

One of the familiar types of commercials that we see in these pre-Christmas days is that which suggests that you show someone you love them with that gift they will remember for a lifetime. Husbands are encouraged to show their wives they love them with a gift she'll always treasure: a diamond bracelet or ring. Or book a romantic trip to

Paris, or an island cruise. She'll love it! And what wife wouldn't be thrilled to find a ring or holiday tickets for two under the tree?

For children, the gifts that they will remember are the toys that are 'hot'. I remember the year that Cabbage Patch kids were all the rage. Parents went crazy in stores, actually fighting for one of these dolls. I am sure that many young girls were on cloud nine when they received that gift on Christmas morning. But I also wonder how many of those dolls lie forgotten somewhere today? When they hit the teen years, the gifts change: they don't want toys, they want stereos, computers, game machines. Again, I am sure that those who get 'just what they wanted' are ecstatic when they open those gifts on Christmas morning.

Some people understand the value of a gift only on the basis of the price tag. If you love me, you will spend more on me. Others will go through a pile of gifts on Christmas morning, only to ask, "Is that all there is?"

We all know that it is not the value of the gift that determines its true value. A mother treasures a hand-made ornament made of construction paper and white glue, simply because it was crafted by their child with all the love that a child can give. Believe it or not, there are also children who have understood the sacrifice and sentiment of a special gift that may not be of great monetary value, but which is special for both the giver and the receiver. It *is* the thought that counts—even though advertisers would suggest that our thoughts should be of something expensive and extravagant.

In the true Gift of Christmas we are given the most precious, valuable, and costly gift ever given. It is also the one that comes right from the heart. It is the gift that we need the most. And it truly is a gift that will bring a life-time (actually, an *eternity*) of pleasure and joy.

The gift of Christmas, of course, is the gift of Jesus Christ. It is a truly priceless gift, as the Eternal Son becomes human that He may give Himself as the ransom for the sins of a whole world. Paul reminds us: you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich. (2 Cor. 8:9)

And what about the love behind the gift? Again, it is Paul who tells us: God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Rom 5:8)
