Dear Friends in Christ, our living Lord:

One of the concerns, frustrations and struggles we have with beginning in-person worship again is that the guidelines from Alberta Health discourage singing by congregations in the church. We may have different feelings about the type of music we like, or about the hymns we especially like to sing. One thing I believe we can agree on is good hymns speak the faith in a very unique and special way. They are expressions of the heart, like the psalms of the Bible. A good hymn confesses the faith we have in the Saviour; they give voice to our praise of God, who has taken away our sin and given us life through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. They are more than an emotional expression; they are words of faith and hope and trust. They are the ways we praise and pray. They comfort the heart; they edify the soul. Luther said that singing hymns can drive away the devil.

Maybe that is why so many hymns come from some of the darkest times of life. One in particular that has been dear to me is an old German hymn that is said to have been more widely used in German churches over the years than any other, with the exception of Luther's great hymn, *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*. When we hear it, we would not think of it coming from such a time of tragedy. Yet the hymn was written during the 30 Years' War of 1618–48—a war that has been described as the most devastating in all history. The hymn? *Now Thank We All Our God*.

Martin Rinkart was called at the age of 31 to pastor the Lutheran church in his native city of Eilenberg, Germany. He arrived there just as the dreadful bloodshed of the 30 Years' War began. He spent the remaining 32 years of his life faithfully ministering to these needy people.

We all know the affects that COVID-19 has had on our country, our province and our city. We have lost so much, and still face so much uncertainty. We read each day about new cases and more deaths. We may have lost our job, been laid off or had our hours reduced. We all know at least one person in this situation, or others who have even lost their businesses. Yet what we experience today was nothing compared to the results of that war between Catholic and Protestant forces from various countries throughout Europe. Germany was at the heart of the war, and during this time the German population dwindled from 16 million to 6 million. Eilenberg, where Martin Rinkart ministered, was a walled city which became a frightfully over-crowded refuge for political and military fugitives from far and near. Throughout these war years several waves of deadly diseases and famines swept the city, as the various armies marched through the town, leaving death and destruction in their wake.

The plague of 1637 was particularly severe. At its height Rinkart was the only minister remaining to care for the sick and dying, sometimes conducting between 40 and 50 funerals a day. He had trouble providing for his family, and his home was often crowded with refugees, too.

As we sing, we commend ourselves to God in each and every need of our lives. We can, and do have, the confidence of our faith that God knows our needs. He has not forgotten us in these days. We may not know all His purposes, but we can rejoice in His love for us. We pray that Hew will, indeed deliver us from all that is happening. We pray He will provide for us. So, what is left, except to acknowledge that in the midst of all that is wrong in this world and in our lives, God is still good and still worthy of praise. To Him be the glory as we sing:

Family Time In Christ

Do you go to the beach together in the summer? It's nice just to spend time wading, building sandcastles, and relaxing on the sand. Take your time on the sand to teach a spiritual lesson to your children.

Watch the waves come in and go out over the sand. Every time there is a wave, the shape of the sand changes (a bit, or a lot, depending on the force of the wave). It will not stay put. Stand in the sand for awhile. It begins to shift under your weight. It moves. What happens to sand if it is windy? It blows everywhere. See what happens to a sand castle when you pour water on it, or when the tide comes in. Ask your children if they would like to build their house on the sand. It would not provide a very solid foundation!

Now see if you can find a large rock by the water. Can water change its shape? Only over a very long time. Will it move if the water comes in? It will stay put. Will the wind blow it somewhere else? No – it will stay where it is. A rock gives a better foundation.

Read Matthew 7:24-27 and discuss:

- How is the faith of believers like a house built on rock?
- Jesus is called our Rock how does He strengthen our faith?
- What comfort do you find in the fact that Jesus, our Rock, does not change?
- How do you build your life on the Words of Jesus?

Find a flat rock and paint it with the word "faith". Keep it where you can be reminded that your faith is built on Jesus, our Rock.

Memorize together Psalm 18:2a: "The Lord is my rock and fortress and my deliverer, my God, my rock in whom I take refuge."

Report from the President

With the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic and the restrictions placed by the province for the safety of all people, we have struggled to work on congregational matters. The Parish Planning Council (PPC) has had 2 meetings using the ZOOM app to work on issues confronting our congregation.

The first issue we have had to deal with is the budgetary woes due to a loss in revenue.

- The university closed so that parking fees we received are now nonexistent. The OROMO congregation is not able to worship at Foothills so we have not collected rent from them. The Preschool was shut down March 15th by the province, so tuition has not been collected from those families.
- It was felt that we needed to reduce hours or terminate positions that we could no longer afford to pay. Our focus was on cutting hours for part-time staff and to look at terminating Betty Ann Chandler's position as teacher/principal of our preschool.

Lorne Rosenau and I met with Brian Vincent to come up with a reduced hours scenario for his duties due to the Covid-19 pandemic restrictions on programming at the church.

As the Preschool was closed on March 15th, Amy Chandler's position as teacher aide was not needed.

Both Brian and Amy were counselled to apply for the CERB funding from the federal government.

Carol Kehler voluntarily reduced her hours to help with our church's budgetary woes.

• Finally, over much discussion, it was decided that due to the many uncertainties about the viability of continuing the preschool in the fall, we would terminate Betty Ann Chandler's position as teacher/principal as of July 30th. The Preschool will not open in the fall. Again Lorne Rosenau and I met with Betty Ann to outline the concerns of the PPC and the Elders prior to this decision.

The PPC and the Elders will review the possibility of reopening the Preschool in the fall of 2021 when we hope that the pandemic has been beaten and the province will have lifted all restrictions on our operations as a church.

There is an area of concern in the operations of our congregation as to having Voter's meetings. With the restrictions on meetings placed by the province, Voter's meetings would be problematic. Motions were put forward at PPC and at the Elder's meetings to have all positions extended by a year rather than worry about holding elections and dealing with the turnover that comes from new people filling those positions. The Voters will have to ratify this motion and a mail out has been prepared to inform the Voters and get a response from the members of that body. Future Voter's meetings may be held that are a hybrid of meeting at the church and using Zoom technology. Details have yet to be worked out.

The PPC and the Elders have adopted the recommendations of our pastoral staff as to the reopening of our church for worship. Unfortunately, we are restricted to holding services with 50 people in attendance (that includes the 5 staff helping to run the service). There are many regulations that must be observed in holding church services in these pandemic times. Please read materials sent out about registering to attend church so that we follow the guidelines set out by the province.

Evangelism/Outreach

We made a major effort during the COVIDS 19 virus outbreak to reach out to our members who might be alone for long periods of time. With the isolation, the quarantine, and with winter lingering, several of our members were quite alone.

After Easter we secured about 40 Easter lilies from Coop Food Stores at a discount and delivered them to about 40 mainly single members of the church. We were able to purchase them at a huge discount. A friend of Foothills wrote a major cheque to pay for the lilies.

We also used the opportunity during the drop-offs to check up and visit with our members. We offered them a Portals of Prayer booklet, a Canadian Lutheran magazine, an Edmonton Concordia Seminary newsletter, and our church's "Foot Print" newsletter.

Some recipients also used the chance to hand off contribution cheques for the church, which we put into the church offering plate on the altar.

We followed up on the Lily Project with a care package for Mother's Day with single mothers and widows in the church. The boxful included a potted plant, a specialty bar of soap, snacks, and an essential item – a roll of toilet paper.

Our gesture was popular with the 31 recipients, and we received many gracious "thank-you" notes and phone calls. Again, we delivered publications with packages and we picked up a few cheques for Foothills. We also performed one shopping trip for groceries.

Thank you to the manager of the Beddington Safeway, Bill Forgay, who gave us a \$250 gift certificate to purchase most of the care package items. We also had a few secondary contribution cheques to pay the bills.

We are just wrapping up the care packages for Father's Day, which included a box of "Dad's" cookies. The boxes are going out to widowers and to single fathers. And once again Bill Forgay gave us a \$250 Safeway gift certificate to pay most of the costs on this effort. We have about 25 deliveries planned.

As for children, we mailed out Kid's Club activity booklets to our younger people. We know children love to receive an envelope in the mail addressed to them! Already we have 20 of those mailed out.

We did reach beyond our congregational lists on all of these efforts, and invited non-members to attend church once we get worship services started up again. If by chance we missed you or a family member, we offer our regrets. We worked hard and fast to make all of this outreach happen.

Thanks again to those who helped out. People were truly grateful to receive the flowers and/or care packages. The good Lord presented us with an opportunity, and we did our best to follow up on it.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,





Ordination Adam Chandler



Adam Robert Chandler was ordained on June 21, 2020 at his home congregation of Foothills Lutheran Church in Calgary, Alberta. Since travel is impeded due to the global pandemic, Adam's assigned congregation of Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church in Victoria graciously permitted him to be ordained in Calgary before being installed in Hope so his extended family could attend. Adam's grandfather (who took part in the ordination), great grandfather, and great uncle also served as Lutheran pastors in western Canada. With his mother having taught in a Lutheran preschool for 17 years (7 of which found his sister working in the classroom), Adam is a fourth generation church worker. Adam was baptized in 1989 by Pastor Eldon Ohlinger, his grandfather, on Pastor Ohlinger's birthday. This was the first infant baptism in the new sanctuary of Foothills Lutheran, wherein Adam was later confirmed and, now, ordained. The stole Adam received in the ordination service was a gift from his grandfather, who in turn had received it as a gift from Foothills on the congregation's 25th anniversary. The Old Testament reading was delivered by

Pastor Ohlinger, Epistle from Regional Pastor Robert Mohns, the Gospel reading by the seminary president Dr. Jim Gimbel, and the sermon by Adam's faculty advisor at the seminary, Dr. John Hellwege. Adam's pastor, David Bode, read a verse over him at the ordination which happened to be the confirmation verse of Adam's uncle. Adam's middle name, Robert, comes from his uncle who died in an accident before Adam was born. Also in attendance were Adam's baptismal sponsors and his first Sunday School teacher. Foothills staff Pastor Bode and Deaconess Miriam Winstanley served as liturgist and organist respectively.



A Peek Into Our Preschool

It is with mixed emotions that I write my final "A Peek into our Preschool" submission to the Foot Print. There has been joy and sorrow over the last couple months.

It has been my joy to be able to set up weekly half hour virtual preschool sessions one-to-one with each of my students in May. Eighteen out of twenty children participated. The first week in May, Ms. Amy and I did porch visits to drop off a craft for the children to make for their moms for Mothers Day. Also included was their artwork from preschool bulletin boards and their Alphabet Scrapbook that we work on over the course of a school year. Each week online, we would complete another page employing stories, songs, games, devotions, and sometimes just chatting about their feelings during this difficult time. The 4 May sessions were free and then families were asked to pay to participate in June. We added our 19th student and even enrolled a cousin of one of our students to join us for the month of June! Two children wished to have 2 half-hour sessions per week! The one-to-one format allowed me to better address the needs of each child. For example, one of our students has a diagnosis of non-verbal ASD and another is already reading at a grade 1 level. Needless to say, their sessions do not look the same. For example, the latter child reads me a passage from her older brother's Children's Bible that was gifted to him when he graduated from our preschool several years ago.

Our PPC decided to close our preschool for the 2020/2021 school year on May 25. Three days later the government gave permission for preschools to open June 1 with restricted class size. Public playgrounds opened as well. I surveyed our families. The vast majority preferred to pay for the virtual preschool sessions instead of sending their child to a classroom in June. Some were concerned with potential exposure to the virus and others wished to wait until September for logistical reasons when older children will be returning to class. The next week, the government gave permission for preschools to offer full class size. I received several enquiries from other families wishing to register for September. Regular weekly sanitizing which has been mandatory for over a decade was augmented to include measures that we added in January. These would stay in place in addition to a few more precautions that already fit our space such as the preschool having its own entrance. Ms. Amy and I are especially concerned for children that qualify for early intervention next year that had registered with us for September. Without being registered in a preschool, they will not receive therapy funding. Some preschools in the NW have lost their space for the fall because of covid-19 so it may be difficult for families to find another program. Our early intervention provider was disappointed we would not be open since we could accommodate children attending 4 mornings or 3 longer mornings which would be the new requirement for therapy, while some of the other preschools they work with cannot.



Our school year closed with a graduation parade where children moving on to kindergarten received a children's Bible and those that would be requiring

preschool received an Arch another of year book. Parents received their tax receipts. Families decorated their cars with balloons, posters, ribbons, etc. This photo is of one of our students who wanted to give her teachers a small gift to place on a table outside the preschool door where the student gift bags lined up. Families were very appreciative that their teachers cared about them through this difficult time. The children also heard that God loves them and that God loves EVERYONE in our weekly tutoring sessions. Given what we see on the news, this message is so important in our world at this

Following that, I will be winding up some clerical pieces with the preschool. July 30 will be my last day.
