

COVID CONTINUES TO CREATE CONCERNS that have led to more restrictions by the government of Alberta. The one that most affects us is the restriction of in-person worship to 15% of the legal capacity of the church. This means that 49 people can be here in worship at one time.

We do require registration, for we don't want to turn anyone away and we want to make the best use of the space that we have available. Our online registration is accessed by going to https://reopen.church/r/aTJSxeNQ. No internet? Call the office by noon on Friday to register for the Sunday service. For Wednesday registration, please call / go online by Tuesday noon. If you need to cancel, you can do this online. If you have any difficulties, please call the office.

We do hope that you remember that we have services both Sunday and Wednesday. There is a schedule for Holy Communion at both of these services.



PURDY'S FUNDRAISER: Thank you to everyone who ordered chocolates through Purdy's for the youth group fundraiser. We raised \$888! The National Youth Gathering registration fee is \$495/person, plus travel, so essentially this fundraiser raised enough to send one youth to Winnipeg in 2022! Your support is greatly appreciated.

If you placed a Purdy's order, it will be available for pickup after the worship service on December 13 in the Fireside Room via the Preschool doors. THE SACRED SEASON OF ADVENT prepares us to greet the Lord who comes to save His people. We invite you to make our midweek Advent Services a special part of this preparation. Services are Wednesdays, at 6:30 pm (also available at Facebook.com\foothillslutheran). We hope you will be with us for this special time of preparation and devotion! We will focus on the ancient "O Antiphons". The hymn "O, Come, O, Come, Emmanuel" (LSB 357) is a rendition

of these medieval antiphons, also called the "Greater Antiphons." An Antiphon is a selection of Scripture and prayer that set the focus for the reading selected for that particular day of the Church year.

The O Antiphons were to be sung during Vespers one on each day seven days before the feast of the Nativity of Christ: from December 17th through the 23rd. Each Antiphon focuses on a Scriptural title for Christ as He is named in Biblical prophecy and a petition to Christ to come fulfilling the promise made through that title and prophecy. We'll look at two each Wednesday and hope you will join us for this countdown to Christmas, and celebration of the Christ who comes to save us. Services are at 6:30 pm, both in-person and online. This week: O Dayspring; O Come, King of Nations.

THE JOYOUS SEASON OF CHRISTMAS is a wonderful time to share your joy and worship of the Newborn King. We continue to hear that many people would consider coming to worship, if only someone would invite them. Of course, this year we don't have the same in-person opportunities as in the past but invite them to join us online. Our 4:00 pm service will be streamed at facebook.com/foothillslutheran. If you cannot watch it live, you can

always access it after that time.

Our festive services are as follows (please note that registration is required for all these services)

December 24 4:00 pm; 6:00 pm Christmas Eve Worship (online at 4:00 pm)

December 25 10:15 am Christmas Day Family Celebration (Communion) (also online)

December 31 6:30 pm New Year's Eve Service (Communion) (also online)

With all the festive services, there will not be a Wednesday service December 23rd or December 30th.

OVER THE CENTURIES, the Christian Church has recognized the "church year" or "liturgical calendar." Most people could name a few seasons of that calendar, such as Christmas, Lent, and Easter. But what is the purpose of observing these different seasons? And what is the benefit of maintaining the distinctiveness of the seasons even as fewer and fewer people are aware of them?

We are now midway through the season of Advent. Advent comprises the four weeks that precede Christmas Day. Its purpose is not to celebrate the birth of Jesus - that will come at Christmas - but to humble ourselves before the coming King.

It's during Advent that we're reminded how ancient Israel waited for the promised Saviour. This is the season in which we hear the preaching of John the Baptist who points us to Jesus. Advent is a time of patient waiting as we pause to ponder the great gift whose birth we will celebrate on Christmas.

The world, of course, has no idea as to what the season of Advent is even about. Long before December rolls around, the trappings of Christmas can be found everywhere. The reasoning is quite simple: if lights and tinsel and seasonal signs can get you into the Christmas spirit, you'll be more generous with your purchases. But once December 25 passes, don't expect to find many reminders of Christmas.

How different it is in the Church. By keeping Advent as a distinct season, we give ourselves the opportunity to savour the beauty of God's plan of salvation. Then, when Christmas finally arrives, our celebration knows the joy of the shepherds as we join in the song of the angels.

Our observance of Advent might be compared to children who wait for weeks to open the presents that temptingly rest under the Christmas tree. The excitement builds and builds until finally the day arrives and the gifts are opened. By sharing in the anticipation of Advent, we arrive at Christmas -- including the 12 days after it which lead up to Epiphany on January 6 - with a deeper understanding and appreciation of the great gift that God has given by sending His Son in the flesh to save this world from sin and death.

DIVINE SERVICE

What is "Advent"?

Advent marks the beginning of the church year. Advent is made up of the four Sundays that come right before Christmas. In other words, the deeper into Advent you go, the closer you get to Christmas Day. For Christians, the First Sunday in Advent is kind of like the "New Year's Day" of the church year calendar.

Why do we celebrate Advent?

The word "Advent" means "coming." During Advent, we prepare for the coming of the One who was born that first Christmas in a stable. We prepare for the One who saved us from sin, death and the power of the devil—our Lord Jesus Christ! What a wonderful and exciting time of preparation!
