Dear friends in Christ:

It doesn't take long after the Christmas displays are taken down for stores to put up displays for Valentine's Day. This day has become a celebration of love, which has made it a "must celebrate" holiday for the romantics and a day to be despised by the lovelorn.

Sending cards, candy, or flowers to a loved one may be one of the stranger ways to celebrate a day that commends one of the martyrs of the third century. Valentine was a physician and priest living in Rome during the rule of the Emperor Claudius. The commemoration of his death, which occurred in the year 270, became part of the calendar of remembrance in the early church of the West. Tradition suggests that on the day of his execution for his Christian faith, he left a note of encouragement for a child of his jailer, who Valentine is said to have healed from blindness. He signed the note, "from your Valentine", written on an irregularly-shaped piece of paper. This greeting became a pattern for millions of written expressions of love and caring that now are the highlight of Valentine's

Day in many nations.

Another common legend states that he defied the emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from war. That would have made him an enemy of the state.

Our secular customs may have little to do with Valentine himself. According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, these customs have more to do with

the time of year during which Valentine's Day is observed. It seems that in England and France during the Middle Ages, there was the belief that halfway through the second month of the year, birds began to seek their mates. So, February 14, St. Valentine's Day, began to be seen as having some special meaning for lovers.

Valentine's Day falls between two even greater celebrations of love. The first one, of course, is Christmas, as God's love is revealed for us in that manger in Bethlehem. The second is Lent, and the reminder of all that our dear Saviour endured that we may be forgiven and have life in His Kingdom.

Valentine was a real person. The legends around him may have some truth. Regardless, there is a love that is very true. It is not legend. It is not imagined. It is love evident in the birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ. It is the love that finds its greatest gift in the loving sacrifice

I don't deserve the love that Jesus has for me. You don't deserve the love that Jesus has for you. Yet our God loves us! He declares: "I have loved you with an everlasting love; therefore I have continued my faithfulness to vou." (Jeremiah 31:3, ESV) John assures us: "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are." (1 John 3:1, ESV)

We have spoken of the various aspects of the word, "love" in the Bible. When we speak of the love that God has for us we always come back to the word, "agape". This love is unconditional and keeps reaching out to other people even when they do not return this kind of love. Even when we say and do sinful things God's love reaches out to us. No, He doesn't want us to wander or to do those things that are against His will. He wants us to live in His love. He wants the best for us, and that includes keeping us from those things that create hurt, pain and wickedness in our lives. He wants us to know the joy of His love as we face each and every day in the confidence of His love.

People may rejoice in Valentine's celebration of love. Others may feel left out because they don't feel loved or don't love anyone else. Knowing we are loved by God; knowing that we are covered by that loving sacrifice of Christ on the cross, and blessed with the life of love we have in His resurrection, we celebrate the greatest love the world has ever known. No one is excluded from this love. Let that love warm your heart this Valentine's Day and always!

Notes from the President

As I am writing to inform you of what has been happening at Foothills, Jason Kenney has announced the beginning of lifting restrictions due to Covid. We will try our best to keep you informed as to the changes that will occur at Foothills for our worship, our Bible studies, and our fellowship opportunities. I am sure that many will still be cautious and concerned that we do not move into these changes too quickly. Masks will still be required for the near future. We will continue to have services put online. Watch for more information to be sent out by the Foothill's COVID Committee to explain the changes as they get implemented.

Now for some other items....

At our last Voter's meeting on January 29, 2022, a motion to close the Foothills Lutheran Preschool was passed. Much thought and discussion was given to this measure, first at the Board of Elders level, then at the Parish Planning Council level and finally at the Voter's meeting. This difficult decision was made as the preschool could not financially sustain itself and would put a burden on the budget that was being presented at the meeting. Also, the need for volunteers to look after some of the administrative tasks required by the preschool would be difficult to fill.

I thank Betty Ann Chandler for her 20 years of faithful service and thank the other staff and volunteers for their service to the mission of the preschool. Betty Ann was always willing to handle this difficult teaching / administrative position; handling a diverse group of students with a variety of learning issues (this would include language issues as well as developmental learning issues).

Sage Properties, who handle the funds previously known as the ABC District Church Extension Fund, are in the process of liquidating the various properties at the Prince of Peace property.

The sale of the bare lands to the north of the school was completed in December at a price of 3.5 million dollars.

The sale of the "Manor" and the "Harbour" has been held up as work to pipe in water from Conrich has not been completed. A potential buyer withdrew their offer to purchase because of this delay.

Prince of Peace school will be taken over by another educational party with a 10-year lease. They wish to purchase the property and they are in a fundraising drive to help make the purchase a reality.

We will be keeping you informed as we learn more.

Regarding the **Representative Action** which our church was a part of; we received information that a settlement had been achieved. We received \$175,803.48 as our portion of that settlement.

We are working on a new lease agreement with the **Oro-mo Lutheran Church** as we are allowing them to worship at Foothills on Sunday afternoons. We hope to eliminate some of the problems that occurred in the past by their congregation use of our facility.

Much work has been completed to satisfy the stipulations of the **Risk Assessment Report** by Ecclesiastical Insurance.

Currently we have an electrician working at making our electrical issues a thing of the past. Our church will be up to code and safer over the long run by his work.

A roofing company has cleaned and repaired the flat section of our roof. They repaired some of the shingles that had come loose on the sanctuary. The gutters and downpipes on the north side (the fellowship hall side of the church) have been replaced and secured. As the weather improves, the roofing repair will eventually be completed.

We recently purchased a fire resistant storage cupboard. This will be a safer way of storing paints and cleaning products at our property.

Ecclesiastical Insurance is pleased with the progress we have made in getting repairs and inspections done.

Watch for announcements from Sarah Knudtson and the Fellowship Committee as they seek ways to offer fellowship opportunities for our members. They have sent out a questionnaire which members can indicate what kind of fellowship they are comfortable in these Covid times.

FEBRUARY IS STEWARDSHIP MONTH!

Stewardship is about giving of our time, talents and treasures to God out of thankfulness for all He has done for us. Even though 2021 was a very difficult year, we have still been blessed with many gifts from our Lord. The most important of these gifts has not changed in the past year. It is the gift of salvation and eternal life through our belief that Christ died to save us. There are other gifts as well. We still live in one of the most affluent countries in the world that allows us the freedom to worship our Lord. We have excellent health care and health care workers who have been so important in preventing loss of life during the Covid crisis. When we examine our lives, we have many blessings to be thankful for and it is out of this thankfulness that we should cheerfully give back to the Lord of our time, talents and treasures.

We have the time as the Lord has blessed each of us with 24 hours of it every day. We should give some of this time back to God every day in Christian service to Him and others, in prayer, personal devotion, worship and Bible study. God has also blessed each of us with gifts and talents and we should willingly look to how we can use our gifts in His church and in our daily lives to further His mission of bringing all people to know Christ. Even with this increase we will fall short of our expenses and will have to borrow from our savings this upcoming year to keep bal-

ance our budget. We are willing to do this as we have significant savings to draw upon and due to the unique situation we are in and recognizing that our members are under financial strain due to the Covid situation. We don't, however, want to be in the habit of using our savings every year to meet our commitment so continue to ask each of you to prayerfully examine if you can increase your offerings in 2021 by at least 2%. This would help our situation.

Please take the time in February to read the various stewardship information we will be providing, to fill out the Time and Treasures Questionnaire and to personally reflect on the gifts God has given you and how you can give those gifts back to Him out of thankfulness for all He has given you.

FAMILY PRAYER WALK

Therefore let everyone who is godly offer prayer to you at a time when you may be found... Psalm 32:6

Lent is approaching – a time for prayer. Active families might want to make their prayers active too. Board of Human Care Ministries

As we care for one another, let us also remember the people in need in our communities.

Please remember:

THE CALGARY FOOD BANK – The food bank has distributed twice as many hampers this year than last year. Non-perishable items can be donated at any grocery store or put in the blue bucket beside the men's washroom.

They also have a "Birthday Kit Wish List". These are kits for children who might not otherwise enjoy the luxury of a birthday party. They are nestled under the Emergency Food Hamper Program and are available for children aged one to 12 whose families are getting a food hamper within three weeks of their birthday. This initiative supports the social well-being of the children accessing the Emergency Food Hamper Program by allowing them and their families to celebrate their birthdays. Last year, the Food Bank distributed 3,628 birthday party kits. The wish list includes a cake mix, icing, candles, balloons, stuffed animal or teddy bear, an age-appropriate book, microwave popcorn, plus party supplies to serve. If you wish to contribute to this initiative, there is a bucket near the washrooms marked "Birthday Kit Wish List" (check out the bulletin board).

THE MUSTARD SEED – The need is great this year with the number of homeless people living outdoors as well as accessing the shelters. Items in great need now are winter coats, boots, warm mitts and gloves, toques and sweaters. If you are cleaning out your closet and don't know where your donations would be put to the best use, please put them in the Mustard Seed bucket and I will deliver them.

INN FROM THE COLD – This organization is also looking for donations of food and clothing as they assist the homeless and people seeking refuge from family situations.

LADIES – SPRING CLEANING?? As you clean out your closet or decide that you have unwanted items, please consider giving those items to <u>Dress For Success</u>. They are looking for gently-used, professional clothing for women re-entering the workplace. Items include things such as skirts, pants, blouses, new hose and underwear items, shoes, purses, boots and jewellery. One of their greatest needs right now are warm winter coats and boots.

MEALS ON WHEELS – What a wonderful opportunity we have to deliver meals to infirmed or shut-ins! Our route consists of between 2 – 4 deliveries every Thursday morning. Do you have a couple of hours to help us deliver meals? With many drivers, we can spread out the days we volunteer. Foothills has been delivering meals for this organization for 35 YEARS!! 

Church Christmas concert role uncovered new talent

"Editor's note: The following Christmas article by Mark Kihn appeared in Manitoba's largest farm newspaper, The Manitoba Co-operator, on Dec. 23, 2021. Take a walk down memory lane with Mark."

I had not chosen the spotlight for that 1973 church Christmas concert. It was more like people had pushed me onto the stage – Mother and the Preacher. Who could resist?

I'm not sure what transpired at that Christmas Eve concert practice on the Saturday prior, but the resulting decisions caused me stress. As a 13-year old teenager, I thought I should have a "say" in all of the decisions in my life. I guessed incorrectly.

Mom had gathered her three youngest children, herded them into the white Chevy Biscayne, and we rambled off from our farm at Basswood, Manitoba, to the Lutheran Church in Erickson. We always enjoyed the 30-minute ride because it meant going down the steep hill of Hwy. #10, and through the Little Saskatchewan (Minnedosa) River valley. At the top, Manitoba's parkland region unfolded – no more prairies. What a vista!

We pulled into the snow-packed church parking lot and tumbled out of the car. It was a normal cold Manitoba winter morning. We rushed into the church. My younger brothers, Tim and Ron, were part of the shepherd entourage, and I assumed I would be also.

But wait a minute! Mom and Rev. Tysseland began a side discussion. He handed Mom a sheaf of papers and she headed my way. I should have ducked and ran. That would have been futile, however. It was tough to avoid Mom, especially when she was on a mission.

Mom sat me down on the front pew. She explained that the teen-age boy who was slated to narrate couldn't make it, so the Pastor chose me to do it. And Mom had agreed.

Things happened fast. I got "stage fright" immediately. In no particular order, I was assailed by tension, stress, anxiousness, and nervousness – and whatever other emotion applied. And worse, Mom's comforting words didn't work.

I protested. I was too young. Who was the fellow who bailed out? I wanted to be a shepherd with my brothers. And finally, "I don't want to." Mom deflected my arguments as easily as NHL goalie Tony Esposito handled shots from the blue line.

Then Mom went on offence. She began to encourage and



praise me. She said I was old enough; that I had a strong voice (thanks puberty); that I was a good reader having read comic books to my brothers; and that the manger scene was made up of older babies, toddlers, early schoolers, and 10-year olds. A few were hardly out of diapers, she mentioned.

Ok, that clinched it. I was in Grade 7, quite above and aloof from that bed-wetter bunch.

I soon stood on the Manitoba Yellow Pages in the actual Pastor's pulpit over-looking the empty church. Hey, what a great view! Maybe those five steps getting here were the actual "Stairway to Heaven" from the rock 'n roll song.

The usual Christmas drama began, with all the usual mishaps. The 10-year olds forgot their lines, the wings fell off the little angels, the toddlers wandered over to the manger to see if a real baby was in it, and the older babies just wanted their mothers. They were hungry too. The rehearsal pressure had reduced them to basic needs: Momma and a cookie.

But as for me, I took to my role. I read the transition parts between scenes. Most of the words were three syllables or less. I didn't have to memorize anything. There was no costume for me – good. Mom said I could wear a suit coat for the performance. It was a hand-me-down from on older cousin, but nobody would know anyways.

Later, Mom said I had read well. The script just called them "angels," not "cherubim's and seraphim's," thank goodness. The Pastor's microphone helped. I would just have to practice my parts a few times on my own. We headed home. We zoomed up that mile-long valley hill then turned west at the empty Cameron School. I promised myself I would cycle the hill on a summer day – but I haven't yet.

My younger brothers were happy too. They used their hooked shepherds' sticks to trip each other and "accidentally" poke one another in the back. Their formula was simple – mayhem equalled fun. The Sunday School teacher/drama director, Mr. Burkett, did not agree, however.

Two days passed quickly. School was already out for Christmas holidays and so we six siblings were carefree. After evening chores, where we left the hay mangers full and the cattle lowing, we crowded into the car. I wore my burgundy suit coat under my winter parka.

Mom helped to relax my tension by leading us in Christmas carols. Dad was gripping the steering wheel and shifting the gears, claiming there were ice and snow patches on the road. Mom suggested that he "slow down a bit."

We arrived to church 30 minutes early. My younger brothers had to don their costumes. My older siblings and parents wanted to get up-front seats. I wanted a glass of water.

I went downstairs and read through my parts one last time. Mom found me and told me to go to the washroom again. She didn't want any troubles – neither did I. She then said I could practice walking up into the pulpit again. Sure, why not?

As we came up through the back altar entrance, I began to hear this rumble of voices, almost a commotion. I looked out and the church was packed. For a village of 500, plus the surrounding area, the place was overflowing. The ushers had set out extra chairs, older teens leaned up against the walls, and tykes stood on Mommas' knees, wobbling, and wailing.

Mom said to walk up to the pulpit and arrange my pages. Okay, no worries, but then Mr. Burkett spotted me. He told me to announce: "The performance would begin in 10 minutes." Okay, but I could feel a leg starting to quiver.

What to do? So I shook my leg even more. Nobody could see it anyway. I blurted out "The Performance begins in 10 minutes." The crowd hushed. My siblings below smiled. I walked back down the pulpit steps, collapsed into a chair, found my glass of water and relaxed. Mr Burkett walked by and muttered a hurried "Thanks."

He was stressed.

I began to reason. Everyone else had decided I could do this job, except for me. I'd better adjust my attitude and "get with it." I might uncover a new talent.

Pastor Tysseland welcomed the congregation, lead an opening prayer, and we began a Christmas hymn, perhaps "Once in Royal David's City." What a chorus of voices from that full house!

I recall few details, as everything blurred, but the whole concert went well, according to my sisters. The angels almost floated, the shepherds herded their stuffed toy sheep, the Wise men remembered their speaking lines, and pronounced "frankincense" correctly. Mary and Joseph moved around the stage perfectly. The cardboard Bethlehem Inn was still too full to have a room. My brothers behaved.

Afterwards, the reviews were good. I had spoken loudly, clearly, with the right emphasis, and at the proper moments. I even received a few "Good job" and "Well done" comments on the way out. I am sure I glowed. I walked on air. A Sunday School teacher handed me a kid's Christmas candy bag. I grabbed it.

I located the family car. Dad had the Biscayne warmed up already. I piled in, accepted a few accolades, dove into the candy bag, and shared it. Mom greeted me with "You did a good job, Mark." Her kind words warmed my heart. They still do.

So for that 1973 Christmas Eve, "the world in solemn stillness lay," and it may have been a "silent night," except for the six exuberant candy-sugar fuelled children in the Chevy.

"Alfred, slow down. There's snow on the road," Mom whispered from the passenger seat.

Evangelism Committee Keeps Busy in 2021

We began the New Year with Maple Cream Fudgemaking and we made hand-offs to selected shut-ins, widows, and widowers. We made 23 drop-offs.

By mid-January, we were cooking and delivering rice/sauerkraut/chicken/vegetable casseroles to selected shutins. We later switched to macaroni/rice/chicken/vegetable casseroles for variety. In all, we made and handed off 18. We repeated this in Nov./Dec. and handed off 14.

In fact, we continued this project for much of the year, especially in the fall. We accepted financial contributions towards the church's Organ Fund.

In February, in order to keep connected with congregation members, we took on the task on emptying and delivering the contents of church mail slots, including offering envelope boxes. With our porch visits, we brought greetings from the church and spread cheer as members accepted their "mail" of Christmas cards, Lutheran magazines, devotional booklets, recent Sunday bulletins, and in some cases, their year-end tax receipts. By the end of February, we had delivered 35 tax receipts.

In March, I twice met with a group that rents the church facilities and invited their attendees to church. Two of them attended FLC around Easter time.

In late April, we were just wrapping up the mail slot hand -offs. We completed 41.

Also in April, we made a deal with the Brentwood Co-op Food Store. We obtained 3-litre jugs of Heinz Vegetable Juice at a discounted rate of \$1 ea. We spread 19 jugs around to shut-ins, once again using the hand-out as a chance for a porch visit. With the on-set of spring, we thought the vegetable juice would remind people of gardening season.

In later July, we did a modest Saskatoon Berry Project wherein we picked wild Saskatoons on Nose Hill and gave away 500 ml containers to shut-ins and others. Later, we picked berries at the Saskatoon Berry Farm in Carstairs and accepted financial gifts for the Organ Fund.

In the fall, we secured \$10 gift cards from the Beddington Safeway and gave away 10 of those to needy and grateful recipients. In one case, two cards went to a non-church family whereby the father had begun into dementia at age 72. He lost his job and the family descended into poverty.

We did three Care Hampers in December to members. Again, Safeway helped us.

Throughout the year, we continued to invite men to the monthly Men's Saturday Morning Bible Study. Our phone calls and text message reminders went to 15-25 people each time. We also invited non-members and lapsed members.

Through all these activities, we accepted Offering Envelopes for the Foothills Treasury. We delivered 78 of those to Foothills as an extra service to our members.

Our great God continues to bless us and keep us during these trying times.


Operation Christmas Child
