Dear friends in Christ:

When I survey the wondrous cross On which the Prince of Glory died, My richest gain I count but loss And pour contempt on all my pride.

(LSB 425, st. 1)

Over the centuries there has been one symbol that has meant more to Christians than any other. It is a strange symbol, when you think about it. It is, of course, the cross. The crosses in churches may be large and beautifully sculpted or small and simply adorned, but each cross has a way of telling the story of salvation. Each cross is a visible reminder of how God the Father revealed His saving love for the world in Jesus Christ.

The cross is a strange symbol for our focus. For the apostle Paul, the cross was not an object of art. It was an instrument of execution. Those who died on the cross were known to be criminals, convicted of the most serious crimes, and therefore subjected to a punishment that left them naked, mocked, dehumanized and shamed on the side of the road for all to see. Crosses were objects of horror not beauty, and those who hung on them were despised not celebrated. Paul, however, confesses a radically different understanding of the cross of Jesus. "But far be it from me to boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world." (Galatians 6:14, ESV)

Paul picks up that thought again and again. In 1 Corinthians 1, he has a testimony to the cross, in which he says: "but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God." (1 Corinthians 1:23–24, ESV)

When we, as the hymn above says, survey the wondrous cross, we are reminded of all the gracious work that Christ has accomplished for us as He bears the eternal punishment of our sin so that He might bestow on us eternal life in His name. The cross may be despised by many, but as many of our hymns remind us, we are drawn to it and to the forgiveness and life we have, because the Eternal Son became one with us so that He could carry all our sin, failures and weakness in His own holiness, and pay the price for our sins. In God's plan, that had to happen through the cross.

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It is sad that this powerful testimony to our sinfulness and God's grace is often removed from churches today. Many don't want to talk about the suffering of the cross. They know that the cross points to our sin because the only reason for the cross is to pay for our sinfulness. Yes, they know God loves them. Yes, they know that Jesus died and rose. Yet they don't speak so much of how Jesus saved us. They do say that He did save us and that He loves us (which is quite true); they say that God wants only good things for us (which is true, but only to a certain extent); and they say that we can be all that God enables us to be if we just work at it (which is false).

In a recent sermon, I spoke of Jesus as the Great Ophthalmologist, who opens the eyes of those who are blind-not just those who are physically blind, but all who are spiritually blind. Yet our Ophthalmologist leaves us with one condition: He leaves us *cross*-eyed. When we "survey the wondrous cross," we give a careful examination and evaluation of it. When we survey the cross, we know the terrible consequences of our sins. But as we look, we also examine our lives in the light of that cross. We see the world in the light of the cross of Jesus. Finally, we see in that cross the love that God has for all mankind,

There is one more thing. The cross is not the end. We will focus on the cross on Good Friday, but we cannot, nor should we, ever separate this from Easter Morning. We glory in the cross, for it brings forgiveness. Yet that wouldn't be enough, were it not for the good news of Easter. The dying Saviour is the living Lord, who continues to bless us, pointing us to the forgiveness and freedom from sin through His cross and to all the hope that is ours in His resurrection from the dead.

As we celebrate Holy Week, may we again be drawn to the cross of Christ, our Saviour. And may we rejoice with exceedingly great joy in the knowledge that Christ is risen indeed!

Our upcoming lessons include:

Family Time In Christ—40 Days

We are approaching the end of the "purple" season Lent in the Church Year, and on April 9th we will enter the "white" season of Easter. The season of Lent is a quiet, contemplative time, meant to prepare us to observe the three important days in Holy Week – Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. Although the number of days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday is 46, we talk about the 40 days of Lent. That's because Sundays, which are always considered to be "little Easters", are not included in the count. The number 40 is significant in Scripture. When we see this number, it us a clue for us that God is doing something important. During these seasons, take some time to talk with your children about some of the "40" accounts in the Bible, and watch for the next important 40th day!

- While Noah and his family, along with two of every kind of animal, were kept safe on the ark, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights. This cleansing flood is connected to baptism by Peter in 1 Peter 2:20-21. Talk about your child's baptism. Remember the day and give thanks to God for making him or her His own dear child.
- Moses spent 40 days and 40 nights in the presence of God on Mount Sinai. There he received the covenant God was making with His people and brought down with him the tablets on which the Law was written (Exodus 24:18 31:18). Upon finding the Israelites worshipping a golden calf, he broke the tablets in anger. He went up the mountain again for another 40 days and 40 nights (Exodus 34), bringing down a second set of tablets for the people. Take a few weeks to review the Ten Commandments from Luther's Small Catechism. For younger children, see Deaconess Miriam or resources. Help children to see how they show us our sin, and tell us that we need our Saviour, Jesus. Give thanks for His death and resurrection for us.
- Freed from slavery in Egypt, the people of Israel wandered in the wilderness for forty years. During that time their feet did not swell, and their sandals and clothing did not wear out, because God was with them. (Deuteronomy 8:4 and 29:5). At the end of forty years, they were brought into the land that God had promised to give them. Discuss with your children how God provides for us in the wilderness of this life, and how He will bring us into our promised land, heaven!

• Jesus prayed and fasted, and was tempted by Satan in the wilderness for forty days. He answered each temptation with God's Word (Matthew 4:1-11). Help your children to identify their own temptations, and to think of ways they can answer them from God's Word. Spend a few extra minutes in prayer each day during these forty days of Lent.

After Jesus rose from the dead, Scripture tells us that for forty days He spent time with His disciples, teaching about the kingdom of God, and showing Himself to more than 500 brothers (Acts 1:1-3 and 1 Corinthians 15:3-8). Remember that His resurrection demonstrates to us that His sacrifice for our sin was accepted by the Father. Remember that because He rose, we also will be raised from the dead! After the 40 days He ascended to heaven. Count forty days to the date when the Church will remember his Ascension and mark it on your calendar. Remember Jesus' promise that He will come again to take all those who believe in Him to be in heaven with Him.

Q:Why does the date of Easter change from year to year?

A: Easter Day is always the Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox on March 21. This full moon may happen on any date between March 21 and April 18 inclusive. If the full moon falls on a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday following. Easter Day cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25.

The Eastern Orthodox Churches have a later Easter because they use a different calendar to date the arrival of spring, rather than the actual astronomical spring equinox. In the year 2001, however, both Eastern and Western churches (including LCC) celebrated Easter Day on the same Sunday--the first time in many, many years.

Is there a theological reason behind all of this? Not exactly. The root problem is this: How exactly do you date when Jesus was crucified and risen? We know it happened on a Sunday, but since Sundays do not always have the same date (i.e., April 23), another system of calculating a date had to be devised. Some in the early church worked it out according to the Jewish Passover, but that also fluctuates with the moon and other factors. Sometimes it even falls on a Sunday. Thus, after nearly 300 years of hassling around with when to celebrate Easter, a church council (Council of Nicea, AD. 325) consisting of all the churches of the day settled on a way to decide when Easter would be celebrated, and that's the way it's been ever since. This can be very confusing, but thankfully we have calendar makers to figure this kind of thing out for us!

At Sunday School they were teaching how God created everything, including human beings. Little Johnny seemed especially intent when they told him how Eve was created out of one of Adam's ribs. Later in the week his mother noticed him lying down as though he were ill, and said, Johnny what is the matter? Little Johnny responded, "I have a pain in my side. I think I'm going to have a wife."
